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ANPR Camera System Privacy Impact Assessment

Aylburton Parish has identified that traffic is seen by parishioners as an important and a serious factor effecting the quality of life on a day-to-day basis. Speeding has and continues to be considered a serious problem throughout the parish.

By using an automated Speed-watch system and by working in partnership with appropriate agencies, Aylburton Parish Council will continue to play a part in helping raise awareness of the dangers of speeding with the objective of contributing to sustainable modified driving behaviours and improved road safety with lower speeds on roads protecting parishioners and visitors to Aylburton.

Data captured by this system does not amount to personnel or sensitive data as it does not identify any individual. A registration plate of a vehicle does not constitute personal data itself and that the data collected cannot identify individuals unless or until it is passed to the Police to be processed in accordance with law. Any actions taken by the Police once data is passed to them will be in accordance with the powers and duties under the General Data Protection Regulations and the Regulation of Investigatory Powers Act

Although data is not personal, there is no wish to be perceived as intruding into privacy and the council wishes to clarify the following privacy impact assessment:

- Automated Speed-watch system captures data in real time. An ANPR captured record places a vehicle bearing a particular registration mark at a particular place at a particular time
- The only purpose of the camera is to capture speeding traffic and for the police to be able to access the system for the prevention and detection of crime in the parish. The criteria for identifying speeding traffic is in accordance with National Standards and there will be regular monitoring of the technology to ensure effectiveness. In line with any speed watch system data will be passed to the Police where applicable.
- Data will only be held in accordance with legal requirements including the National ANPR data standards.
- As with any Speed-watch initiative, data which is not assessed as personal data at the point of capture, will be passed to the police to process in accordance with law. Only authorised, trained individuals can access the system. Authorised personnel are the Parish Clerk – Rachel Hales and two named Councillors. Gloucestershire police also have access with officers having passwords to access the system. Charles Pedrick, the ANPR system administrator also has access.
- Any data can be used to report the speeds being recorded in designated areas.

- The aim is re-education and speed awareness and by working collaboratively with partner organisations, only the Police will be able to take any action in relation to speeding, if applicable. Statistical data will also be used to help contribute to working with partners to make effective and informed decisions regarding road safety.
- Data is held on a secure server which only authorised personnel can access. Data will be deleted in line with national protocols. No data is held or stored on laptops or computers for longer than necessary, in line with the Council's data retention policy. Only anonymised statistical data is used for evaluation purposes as part of the Safer Communities project.
